IT'S REALLY OVER!!

It's done. Fini. Say goodbye to traffic jams, dodging orange barrels and trying to guess which lanes are open. The worst part of the Telegraph Rd. project IS OVER!

Goodbye orange barrels and hello restoration. Most of the restoration will take place on the medians.

As far as restoration, the medians will be the main focus. Approximately 90 trees of varying species will be planted in October. There will be Horse Chestnuts, Dogwoods, Sweet Gums, Crimson King Maples, Ginkos and Little Leaf Lindens.

Village resident Maggie Van

Camp designed the plan. The idea was to provide color in the spring and fall. The Village has planned to provide oversight during the planting of the trees to make sure they are planted correctly.



Additionally, the grow zones

will be replanted. When it was recognized that this project was going to wreak havoc on the medians, the Village had Johnson Landscaping salvage as

many plants as possible and store them in areas in the Village.

Sidewalks will be installed on the east side of Telegraph to provide tenants

in the buildings with a safer walkway and perhaps encourage walking during lunch hour. These sidewalks are seasonal which means they will not be maintained during the winter as far as snow and ice removal services.

The Village was able to have the sidewalks constructed as part of the Telegraph Rd. Reconstruction Project at no cost to the Village.

The Village will be responsible for repairs in the future.

SEPTEMBER ELECTION RESULTS

The votes are in and Bingham Farms voters elected three trustees to serve a four-year term on the Village Council. Newcomer Jeffrey Modell joins incumbents Dorothy Warren and Delores Tripp.

Jeffrey joins the Council after serving for more than 10 years on the Design Review Board, most recently as Chairman.

Delores Tripp became a trustee in March of 1999. She is currently serving as President Pro-Tem. Ms. Tripp also serves on the Personnel Committee.

Dorothy Warren became a trustee in March of 2009. Previously, she served on the Planning Commission for 12 years.

The newly-elected trustees took the Oath of Office at the September 26th Council meeting. Their terms will expire in September 2015.

LARGE ITEM PICK UP SET FOR OCTOBER 13th

It's here again. The Village's semiannual large item pick up will take place on Thursday, October 13, 2011.

The purpose of this pick up is to give residents the opportunity to dispose of large items such as sofas, chairs, washing machines and similar large items without charge.

All you have to do is bring the items to the street, right along with your regular trash. Car Trucking, will haul it away. Then it's gone...for good. Better yet, there are no extra charges.

The contractor also picks up freezers and refrigerators if doors and the Freon are removed prior to placing them at the street. Car Trucking is not licensed to remove Freon or transport appliances that have Freon in them.



WEST NILE VIRUS ARE WE WINNING THE BATTLE?

Residents of Oakland County continue to effectively battle the West Nile Virus. With the exceptionally wet weather earlier this summer bolstering the mosquito crop, it's now more impor-

tant for people to take precautions that will limit the number of human infections.

Unbelievably this year, there has been only one human case reported. The sole case is in Macomb County.



However, we're not out of the woods yet as September and October are historically the time when most human cases are reported.

The incubation period from bite to symptoms ranges from 2 to 14 days. Most people infected with West Nile do not show any symptoms. Twenty percent, however have flu-like symptoms, including fever, fatigue, headache and muscle or joint pain. Less than 1% of infected humans become severely ill.

The fact that people are still coming down with the Virus, shows that West Nile Virus remains a problem. There are still plenty of mosquitoes carrying the virus. Prevention measures do work. The best advice — keep doing what you are doing.

The Oakland County Health Department recommends that folks take steps to::

* Reduce areas where mosquitoes

breed.

- Repel to protect against mosquitoes, and
- Report potential mosquito breeding areas.

Other measures that can reduce the risk of contracting the virus include:

- Repair all holes in window and door screens to keep mosquitoes out of your home.
- Empty water from mosquito breeding sites such as buckets, barrels, cans and old tires.
- Avoid being outdoors when mosquitoes are most active (dawn and dusk).
- Wear light colored, long-sleeved shirts and long pants when outdoors.
- Apply insect repellants that contain DEET to exposed skin or clothing. Always follow the manufacturer's directions for use. Do not apply repellent containing DEET on children less than two years of age.

If you find any dead birds, report your findings to the Oakland County Health Division Hotline at 1-877-377-3641. Then properly dispose of the bird. Wear gloves to protect yourself from direct contact with the bird.

This is an efficient way to let residents know what is going on in the Village and surrounding municipalities. It is information a resident needs to know.

The Village will only use the email blasts for important issues. The Village newsletter will carry more detailed and routine Village information.

Please note, that the Village newsletter will now be available solely online. The printed newsletter was eliminated due to budget constraints.

pick up. It may be best to have a dumpster delivered to your home if you have too much to be collected under this special program. While there is a charge, you will know that all materials will be taken away and it gives you more time to gather up all that needs to go.

A few other regulations apply. Car Trucking will only take one 32-gallon garbage can filled with construction material. If you have more, please call Car Trucking at 586.791.8480 to arrange a special pick up. Car Trucking cannot drop off construction materials as residential waste as substantial fines can be assessed.

BURNING LEAVES IS ALLOWED IN THE VILLAGE Regulations (Chapter 50.02)

- 1. Do not burn leaves, grass or rubbish on any paved or bituminous surfaced street;
- 2. Do not burn any type of refuse where smoke, ashes or odor will create a nuisance, public or private;
- 3. Do not burn rubbish closer than 15 feet to a building;
- 4. Do not leave a rubbish fire unattended.

LATEX PAINT IS NOT HAZARDOUS WASTE

It sure is easier to just take all that latex paint, pop it in your trunk and take it to SOCRRA for disposal. However, the contract the Village has with SOCRRA is for disposal of hazardous waste. Latex paint IS NOT considered hazardous.

The Village is charged no matter what a resident drops off.

There are several ways to easily discard latex paint at no cost.

Natural Drying - With paint cans that are less than a quarter full, simply remove the lid and place the can in a well-ventilated area. The remaining paint should be dry within a few days. Once dry, it can be placed in the trash or chip out the paint directly into the trash and put the empty paint can in the recycling bin.

For paint cans that are more that a quarter full, here are a few options:

Kitty litter - This common, household absorbent works well in removing the moisture from latex paint. How much kitty litter to add depends

on the makeup and age of the latex paint. In most cases, start with a cup or two and add as needed. Stir thoroughly and after a short time, the paint will

thicken. Dispose of the hardened material in the trash and recycle the empty paint cans.

Saw Dust, Mulch, Small Animal Bedding, & Sand – These are other common absorbents that can be used to thicken and solidify latex paint. Use them the same way you would use kitty litter. Remember to recycle empty paint cans and lids after disposing of the hardened paint.

DISPOSING OF HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE

More residents are taking advantage of year round disposal of household hazardous waste. Per an agreement with South Oakland County Resource Recovery Authority (SOCRRA), Village residents have access to their facility located on Coolidge in Royal Oak. It is between Maple and Fourteen Mile Rd., across from Meijer's.

The facility accepts most house-

hold items that are considered hazardous, such as automotive products, batteries, pesticides and appliance and flashlight batteries.




Oil based paints are accepted.

A complete list of acceptable materials may be found on SOCRRA's website: www.socrra.org.

When transporting hazardous materials to the facility, make sure the containers are tightly sealed to prevent accidental spills. This may require the use of a box or other container to hold the cans. Place the materials in the trunk of your car. All products must be clearly labeled.

Electronics, such as TVs (no consoles), computer monitors, CPUs and

WILD ANIMAL POPULATION GROWING

You either love them or hate the wildlife. There's no in between.

The Village continues to receive sporadic complaints about the growing deer population and their impact on land-scaping. A few residents have asked if the deer could be shot.

First, hunting is prohibited in the Village to ensure the safety of its residents. Second, in a controlled hunt, deer have to be rounded up and herded into a specified area. It cannot be here and there. The DNR becomes involved with controlled hunt and its highly unlikely one would be approved in the Village as there is no suitable location in this populated area.

As far as the coyote population, trapping is not an option. First, live bait must be used in the trap and second, the traps must be monitored daily. The cost for trapping is prohibitive.

There are natural ways to protect landscaping, such as applying Liquid Fence or using automatic sprinklers that are activated by movement. There is a publication, Gardens Alive that provides ideas for dealing with wildlife.

OPERATION MEDICINE CABINET

Operation Medicine Cabinet continues. The program is run by the

Oakland County Health Dept. and was created to provide residents with an easy and safe way to dispose of old prescriptions.



Residents can drop off their old prescriptions at the Village of Beverly Hills Public Safety Dept. located at 18600 Thirteen Mile Road. They will log it in and properly dispose of the medications.

Place medications in a Ziploc bag and drop it off. There is no charge.

Needles and syringes are not accepted.

OUR POLICE DEPARTMENT MOUNTED DIVISION MAKES A MEMORABLE TRIP TO WASHINGTON D.C.

What an honor to be invited to Washington DC to honor our fallen heroes. The Franklin Bingham Mounted Police Division joined 70 other mounted officers from around the country to honor fallen officers on the annual Law Enforcement Memorial Week in May.

Sgt. James Hirschfeld with his quarter horse Jake, Ron Berris with his Percheron-quarter horse Josie and Mike Sanders with his standard breed Buddy, hit the road to make the 500 plus mile trip.

Law Enforcement Memorial Week was started back in the early '60s by President John F. Kennedy. This year the Mounted Division commemorated the 162 officers who died in the line of duty in 2010.

Approximately 5,000 police officers, honor guard members and family and friends of the fallen officers attended Memorial Week.

The Franklin Bingham Mounted Division is a regular sight at various celebrations during the year. such as Franklin's Round-up in September and Memorial Day festivities in May.

One of the major problems the Village faces each year is with snow removal, especially residents and/or their contractors who plow snow from the driveway across the street. What remains are called snow rows.

These snow rows can freeze and can cause problems with the Village's snow plow contractor, pedestrians and public safety vehicles.

This procedure is against not only Village ordinance but also state law.

It is important that residents inform their private snow removal contractors that the snow that falls on your property stays on your property.

Last year there was super compliance. The Village only sent out a handful of reminders. Ticketing can oc-

cur for noncompliance, but that's the last thing the Village wants to do.

ure in writing tickets to residents. Remember, the primary goal is to keep the streets safe for everyone

The Village will again continue its contract with Johnson Landscaping to provide snow removal services and salt applications.

The snow plows are called out as soon as 2 inches have fallen on the roads. In heavy storms, the contractor will plow several times to keep the roads passable.

The Village will request additional work when conditions warrant. The decision to plow and salt the roads is based on the assessment of the police department. Similar to last year, the Village will salt all the roads, when necessary, to make travel less challenging. However, this is Michigan. Conditions can change in a matter of hours. Drive with care.

RULES EVERY RESIDENT SHOULD KNOW

Contractor Signs are not allowed. This includes building contractors, driveway contractors, window companies, etc. The Franklin Bingham Police Dept. will remove them.

Solicitors must be registered with the Village office. If you have a "No Solicitation" sign affixed to your entry way, they are not allowed to approach you.

Tree & Woodland Protection Ordinance was enacted to prevent clear cutting of wooded parcels of property or excess removal of healthy trees. See Chapter 93 of the Village Code.

Driveway Permits are required for driveway reconstruction or sealcoating. The cost is \$25.00.

Building Permits are needed for major renovations as well as electrical and plumbing work and roofing. Some projects require Village approval before securing a permit. Call the Village office early in the design process to avoid any delays during construction.

LARGE ITEM PICK UP REGULATIONS

Date: Thursday, October 13, 2011

Time: All items at street by 7:00 a.m.

ACCEPTABLE ITEMS

- Large appliances, furniture and hot water heaters (Refrigerators & freezers must have Freon removed prior to placement at the street)
- Only small tree stumps
- Brush and tree branches must be bundled and the length should not exceed four feet
- Rolls of carpet and linoleum must be tied together with the length not to exceed four feet
- Disposal of construction materials is limited to one 32-gallon trash container

UNACCEPTABLE ITEMS

- Large tree stumps
- Hazardous waste
- Tires
- Automotive parts
- Loose gravel
- Large amounts of construction material & loose items

Large items such as appliances and furniture may be placed at the street the weekend before the pick up.

Car Trucking has the right to refuse to pick up excessive amounts of materials. If you have a large quantity of items, please call Car Trucking at 586-791-8480 and make special arrangements to rent a dumpster.



CHANGE YOUR CLOCKS! CHANGE YOUR BATTERIES!

Spring forward and fall back. This time of year is when we can garner an extra hour of sleep.

Turn your clocks back one hour on **November 6th**. Or as many do, turn them back before you go to bed on Saturday night. Eastern Standard Time begins at **2:00 a.m. November 6th.**

Unfortunately, it also means that shorter days are coming and another Michigan winter is not far away.

While changing your clocks, remember to change the batteries in your smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors.

Be proactive. Take a few minutes to make sure all your detectors are working. It might not just save your house, it may also save YOU.

WILL YOUR MAILBOX HOLD UP THIS WINTER?

There's any easy test. If your mailbox is on a post, just shake the mailbox. If the mailbox or post is loose, take the time now to tighten screws and secure the posts.

Every winter there are a few residents who complain that the snowplow knocked over their mailbox. Eric Wilson, Chairman of the Road Commission says

"In most cases, the snowplow doesn't actually hit the mailbox. The force of snow thrown form the roadway is enough to knock down a loose mailbox"

And if you're putting up a new roadside mailbox, it should be 36 to 42 inches ff the ground and the post should be 8 to 12 inches behind the shoulder or curb. The mailbox should not protrude into the road.
